We are seeking a motivated and resourceful person to join our archaeology team at the British School at Rome. This role provides an opportunity to develop a range of skills in archaeological survey and geophysical prospection.

This is a full-time post (based at the British School at Rome, Via Gramsci, 61 – 00197, Rome) with frequent travelling for fieldwork in Italy and occasionally abroad. The appointment is fixed term for one year (from April 2024).

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The main duties and responsibilities will be:

- Geophysical prospection in Italy and occasionally abroad.
- Topographical survey and 3D recording.
- Preparation of technical reports.
- Participation in the BSR's 'Falerii Novi Project'.

Main skills and experience required:

- A degree in archaeology or related earth science discipline.
- Prior experience of archaeological geophysical prospection.
- Experience in topographical survey using GPS/Total Station.
- Prior experience of point cloud data processing.
- Proficiency in GIS/Cad software.
- Good communication and collaborative skills.
- Availability to travel for fieldwork.

Desirable

- An understanding of the basic concepts of Laser Scanning and experience with the Leica Cyclone software package.
- Prior experience of photogrammetry.
- Prior excavation experience.
- Proven ability to conduct independent research utilising library and archival sources.
- Written and spoken English and/or written and spoken Italian.
- Full driving license.

This is a post based in the BSR's Rome headquarters, in Via Gramsci, 61 – 00197, Rome, with frequent travelling for field works in Italy and, occasionally, abroad. The appointment is fixed term for one year (from April 2024).
